With both modes available we hope to see an increase in participation. We saw a large increase in students completing the academic year with an overall GPA of 2.5 or higher. Fall academic grades were reported in the grading scale of A-F for all of the schools we serve. In the spring students that attended Fortuna High, Eureka High, and Castle Rock Charter Schools' were the only students that were given the opportunity to earn a letter grade. This gave those students the opportunity to boost their GPA as opposed to Del Norte High students that only received a Pass/Fail option. Although the P/F option only had an affect on 2 of our students from Del Norte not reaching the 2.5 or higher mark, it did have a huge impact on our seniors who were not given the opportunity to raise their 	y Edit Delete
